An enriching educational experience

Careers education and real life learning

An inclusive teaching and learning environment

The Henry Morris Centre

The Learning Support Centre, now based at the bottom of the Science block and named after the College's founder, has benefited from refurbishment. The space now benefits from an Interactive White Board, movable screens for quiet study, a games trolley for break and lunchtime, new sensory toys and lights for the sensory room and bulbs for the HMC garden. Students benefit from access to this space during lessons and social times. Thank you to the Friends of LVC for supporting this development with funds from the Department for Education.





Healthy relationships

The working party has continued to develop educational resources to support students' understanding of prejudicial behaviour, including sexist, racist and homophobic remarks, and to equip staff with tackling unacceptable language. This approach is strengthening respectful relationships and appreciation of diversity within the College community.

An ambitious curriculum and high expectations

Teaching and Learning Strategy developments

We are proud of our Teaching and Learning working party, led by Mrs Kahr, who have developed an exciting strategy that will be launched in September. The approach, founded in our school values, will ensure greater consistency of approach. Inclusive classrooms, an evidence-informed approach to embed high quality teaching, is the vehicle that we are



using to implement our teaching and learning strategy. Teachers engaged in inclusive classrooms training on our June training day.

Improvements in Maths teaching

The Maths department has been developing a new curriculum this year integrating principles of Mastery. This follows two years of professional development with the Cambridge Maths Hub (Mr Ansell and Mr Mikkides) and involvement with the England-Shanghai Teacher Exchange Programme (Mr Fehr). On 14th June, we hosted head teachers from other Trust secondary schools to conduct a curriculum peer review. The day was spent observing lessons, meeting with staff and speaking with students. The feedback highlighted the significant progress made by the maths department with developing high quality teaching materials and strategies to provide all students with support and challenge.

Improved consistency of behaviour for learning

The use of climate walks to monitor behaviour for learning have noted a significant reduction in the number of lessons affected by low level disruption. The focus of hourly walks around the school led by senior and middle leaders shifted this term to capture good examples of teaching practice. Members of the behaviour working party have also conducted learning walks to identify and share effective classroom management practices. Student panels have also been used to evaluate and make changes to our Behaviour and Discipline policy which is currently being consulted on. Feedback from the Senate has also helped to shape the refresh of the Linton Learner values, which will be streamlined to focus on four of our existing attributes for explicit teaching, praise and reward.









Linton Learner achievements

Linton Blue

Over 77,000 House points have been issued so

far this academic year with an average of 91 points per student. I am also issuing over 200 Linton Blue badges this week in recognition of consistently excellent learning behaviours, based on reporting data. We are currently trialling a new reward system called Behaviour Box which allows staff to issue electronic postcards. This will create more timely opportunities for praise.

Student leadership

A new cohort of Prefects have been appointed to fulfil their responsibilities across the school. We have also recruited a new batch of 8M8s who have already engaged with training and are supporting Year 6s with their transition to LVC. Form representatives are currently being consulted on a refresh of the Linton Learner attributes and their use in teaching and learning, reporting and rewards.



Dance Show and Summer Soiree

The school hall has been alive once again with the sound of music and the joy of live performance. The April Dance Show offered a diverse range of pieces inspired by musical theatre and topical issues. The Summer Soiree showcased stunning musical talent.

Mental health and wellbeing app launch

TRANGUILITI

LVC is involved in a Trust-wide pilot of Tranquiliti digital wellbeing service with Years 8 and 10. Students answer weekly questions from Tranquiliti's Wellbeing Model via an app, covering mental wellbeing, health and wellness, learning and the school environment. The information that students enter gives them a picture of their own wellbeing and enables them to access trusted resources and support. The information collected also creates insights for pastoral staff, helping us provide relevant support and notice patterns in wellbeing across the school.
