Update from the Governors

The two newly elected parent governors, George and Ronan, have made a great addition to the Linton Governing Body. George has a wealth of experience in education, and her depth of knowledge around special educational needs has been a huge support to the governors this year. Ronan has proved to be excellent with his questioning at meetings, especially regarding the behaviour and mental health of the children at Linton.

During this term, the governor meetings focused on special educational needs, safeguarding, pupil premium, and the outcome of the parent/children/staff surveys. The parent survey results were presented at the July meeting. The key takeaways from this survey were communications to parents from staff, support with study skills, academic mentoring, revision techniques, and managing exam pressure. The school is looking at how to further support the children, especially those going into Year 10 and 11.

Post-lockdown, the school has continued to hold events such as parent consultations online. The survey results also showed that parents are keen for more opportunities to meet with staff in person to discuss the needs of their children. This is being reviewed in terms of how the school can support this for the new academic year. Disruptive behaviour of children was also highlighted as a concern for many parents. Sam Kerley has been appointed as the behavioural lead at LVC, and with the support of an external specialist, he has already started to make an impact with a strategy focused on supporting an effective, respectful, and calm learning environment.

The governing body and Friends of LVC are always looking for volunteers to support their work. If you feel that you have any availability and would like to support your child's school, we would love to hear from you.

School improvement priorities and leadership responsibilities

Our whole school improvement priorities have been reviewed based on progress made this academic year and feedback from stakeholder surveys. Please find our updated priorities for 2024/25 below.

- 1. Empower all leaders to drive school improvement.
- 2. Establish a culture of professional collaboration.
- 3. Embed Ambitious, Inclusive and Enriching teaching and learning and establish effective AIE assessment practices across the school.
- 4. Ensure that all students' behaviour is ready, respectful and safe in and outside of lessons.
- 5. Build community relationships.

There are some changes in the Senior Leadership Team from September following the departure of Mr Jenkins mid-year and to create balanced teams leading on Curriculum and Inclusion. The main change is that Mrs Matarazzo's main area of responsibility will be the leadership of the curriculum and assuring the quality of education, including overseeing the standards of teaching and learning. Mr Darby will become responsible for Inclusion, including strategic responsibility for behaviour and attitudes and personal development, including assuring the quality of pastoral care.




Midsummer Music Concert

An ambitious curriculum and high expectations

Reading scheme

We are very grateful to a dedicated team of Year 10 pupils who have continued to support Year 7s to read, discuss and enjoy books. Mrs Hay continues to make the Library a vibrant and exciting space; she does all she can to promote reading around topical issues, publicise the latest in contemporary children's fiction and lead craft activities which often have a Literary theme! All Year 7 and 8 groups have enjoyed being able to use the Library in Literacy lessons where we have prioritised the joy of reading and the opportunity to discuss the issues covered in a diverse range of books.

Curriculum Design

The Teaching and Learning Team have continued to work closely with Subject Leaders this term on the development of our ambitious, inclusive and enriching curriculum design. We are really proud to be able to share with you the Knowledge and Skills pillars for each subject at the beginning of the next academic year. These pillars allow learners to develop a secure knowledge over time; key concepts are built upon as they are interleaved through the five-year curriculum. A shared understanding of these allows parents and carers to effectively support our young people in their learning journey. This structure will be a fundamental part of how we both deliver and how learners experience the ambitious, inclusive and enriching curriculum at LVC. Our focus next academic year is on assessment; how do we ensure that learners know where they are on their journey and more importantly, how to make progress. We will be conducting surveys with all stakeholders next term, please do look out for these.

Behaviour update

Rewards Points This academic year, a substantial amount of reward points have been achieved by students across all year groups. Close to 100,000 House points have been awarded to recognise Linton Learners' curiosity, independence and responsibility. Students have also achieved their bronze, silver or gold 'wings' when achieving House point thresholds to recognise their hard work and conscientious approach to their studies. Furthermore 200 Linton Blue badges have been awarded to celebrate students' excellent learning attributes across the year. We look to continue the development of our rewards system next year, taking on board the feedback from students via the Senate's recommendations.

Behaviour Systems Greater consistency has been achieved this year through staff members developing common behaviour for learning approaches and logging behaviour events using Go4Schools more systematically. The renaming of House points to align with Linton Learner attributes has provided further clarity to inform students and parents/carers for the reasons for awarding them. We have been working on the use of common language by staff to communicate behaviour expectations in and outside of lessons, linked to the need for all members of the College community to be safe, respectful and ready to learn. The development of our internal behaviour digests and tracking mechanisms has helped to develop Heads of Year approach to pastoral interventions, including the use of Individual Behaviour Plans escalating to Pastoral Support Plans for students that struggle to meet our behavioural expectations. Celebration assemblies have taken place on a termly basis to share pride of students' achievements. We will continue to embed behaviour for learning training and systems next academic year to ensure that the College community is ready to learn, respectful & safe as we aim for all students to make as much progress as possible academically as well as socially.

Uniform Standards of uniform have improved this year with the majority of students demonstrating a pride in their membership of the College community in their wearing of correct uniform. We have supported families to address persistent uniform issues with financial support and with helping to find solutions. Year 10s have been wearing their black jumpers to show their transition to Year 11. Although there have been times whereby standards of uniform have dropped, we have recently seen the student body take pride in their appearance by wearing the correct uniform. Thank you to parents/carers for your support to ensure that staff's focus can remain on students' learning, wellbeing and progress.




Jubilee cup

48 students have successfully completed the expedition section of their Bronze DofE certificate. This was carried out in the Littlebury area where orienteering skills were put to the test. Despite 48 hours of rain, leaden skies and cows blocking pathways, students demonstrated great resilience. Next year this offer will again go out to year 10 students.
