#### Embedding ambitious, inclusive and enriching teaching and learning

This term we have conducted an internal curriculum enquiry into Computing and Mrs Matarazzo has represented the College on a curriculum enquiry team at Sawston Village College. We were pleased to see the amount of work that Mrs Chiy has put into re-designing the Computing curriculum with a clear focus on students' learning across five years. Teaching resources are available to students electronically and promote some independence.

We have also taken part in a broader curriculum enquiry which included SENCO colleagues from other secondary schools in Anglian Learning, plus the Trust's Director of Inclusion and Specialist Teacher join us for a SEND enquiry day. This enquiry focused on how students with lower prior attainment are catered for at LVC. Visitors spent time meeting with Mrs Garner, our SENCO, Mr Palmer, Deputy SENCO and Mrs Tooke Assistant SENCO. They spent time meeting with students on our SEND register and conducting learning walks in a number of lessons across the curriculum. The team also reviewed SEND data in relation to attendance, behaviour and academic progress. The enquiry team were very positive about our SEND identification process and the way in which SEND information was shared with teachers and the wider staff through student passports. They highlighted examples of effective inclusive classroom practices in which the climate for learning

and the quality of questioning and adaptation by teachers were supporting learners with SEND to engage and make good progress. They also recognised the hard work of the Inclusion team in making strides forward with the quality of provision for SEND learners.

We are committed to providing students with an ambitious, inclusive, and enriching curriculum. Moreover, in the Summer term we will re-visit how to ensure that our classrooms enable all learners to be successful. Initially, this will involve looking at how we provide students with the support they need to understand what they are learning and then how we begin to gradually step back to allow students to practise on their own. In educational terms, this is referred to as scaffolding. Our review of scaffolding has already started with subject leaders discussing what works best in their disciplines and we look forward to further collaboration after the Easter break. Furthermore, we will also focus on our whole school reading strategy to provide staff with further training and approaches to help students with lower reading scores to access the curriculum and develop their reading fluency.

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#### Ensuring ready, respectful and safe behaviour

### Attendance

It has been very pleasing to see the overall attendance improve over the last half term and we thank you for your support with this. Over the Spring term we have reviewed our processes for monitoring attendance, updated our Attendance policy, and adopted the Local Authority's suggested approach to communicating concerns with parent/carers.

We continue to reward sustained or improved attendance every week and are looking more closely at punctuality to ensure that students are ready on time for both registration and lessons.

Please do remember to report absences to the College by 8.30am every day that a child is absent. This easiest way to do this is via email (attendance@lintonvc.org) or by completing the online Daily Absence Reporting Form, and providing specific details including any medical condition or symptoms.

If you have any concerns regarding your child's attendance, do let us know and we will explore what support we can offer.

#### **Behaviour**

Even with a shorter term, we have continued to see an extremely positive attitude by our student body here at Linton Village College. Students have managed to achieve a total of 24,205 reward points, which has included 1919 Postcards. As part of the Attendance strategy we have continued to reward students for their sustained and improved attendance as well as having a focus on reducing the number of minutes of lost learning, which have significantly reduced this term.

We continue to have a focus on implementing restorative conversations held by staff members. The purpose of this is to reflect upon the event and the reasons as to why it reached the consequence, taking into account the impact not just upon the student but also their peers in the lesson/social situation and the member of staff. It is also our aim to develop consistent lines of communication between all stakeholders of the College community so timely feedback is given and

acted upon.

The students featured all helped with stewarding on the evening of the fireworks display in the village. The Friends will be investing this money into improving students' educational facilities at the College.

Members of the Debate Club attended Lucy Frazer MP's Schools Debating Final held in the House of Commons on Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> March. Our speakers did incredibly well, speaking in one of the parliamentary committee rooms in front of an audience of attendees from schools across Cambridgeshire in the debates that were adjudicated by Lucy Frazer and the highest-ranking lawyer in the UK, the Attorney General Victoria Prentis. Supported by friends and family, our two speakers, Lilian and Will, received commendations for their strength of argument and their confident delivery. Will achieved third place and Lilian placed amongst the runner ups out of the 16-strong field of participants. We were fortunate to have a private tour of the House of Commons by Lucy Frazer herself and the opportunity to pass through the voting lobbies as if we were voting on a government motion as our MPs do every day.

### An enriching educational experience

#### **Science Week**

Each LVC year group did a different activity during Science Week this year. Year 7 investigated who had stolen Nibbles the crocodile, Year 8 took part in a science fair and Year 10 had a presentation on the wonders of worms.
