

Top Tips for Literature Revision

1. Make the most of lessons

Teachers have planned the remaining weeks specifically to meet your needs both in response to past performance but also to fully prepare you for upcoming mocks. Bring your annotated text books (Macbeth, An Inspector Calls, Jekyll and Hyde or A Christmas Carol) to your lessons. Make notes and be prepared to write plenty of practice answers so that you are thoroughly prepared for the exams in May.

2. Complete homework on Satchel:one

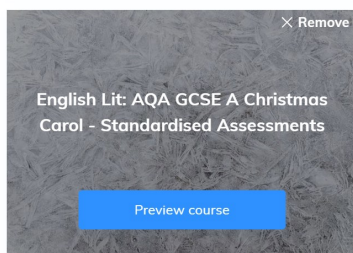

4. Re-read the core texts and learn key quotations

Ensure you are familiar with plot, character, theme, context and key quotations for each literature text. As it is a closed book exam, you are not able to take copies of the text in with you.
