Belonging by Design: Mental Health

As Director of Inclusion for Anglian Learning, I wish to share our <u>Belonging by Design</u> strategy. This initiative is a priority for Anglian Learning for the next three years. The five strands of Belonging by Design are Attendance, Communities, Inclusion, Mental Health and Relationships.

Anglian Learning is beginning a collaboration with Cambridge-based charity, <u>The Foundation for Young People's Mental Health</u> to progress the <u>Mental Health</u> strand of Belonging by Design. The collaboration aims to help Anglian Learning and its schools select and implement evidence-based approaches for:

- Preventing and recognising mental health conditions, such as depression.
- Supporting and managing pupils experiencing mental ill health.

The first phase will focus on providing accessible information to colleagues, pupils, parents and carers to improve understanding of:

- What depression is and what causes it
- How to manage personal risk factors
- How to make simple lifestyle choices that promote positive mental health

While the initial focus is on depression, the prevention strategies will promote overall mental wellbeing. YPMH's research highlights the impact of everyday factors such as food, movement, sleep, chronic stress, loneliness, and substance use on mental health. Improvements in these areas can help prevent and even reduce conditions like depression.

Alongside YPMH, Anglian Learning will work with existing partnerships. <u>Innovate IFG</u> our school's catering suppliers and <u>Anglian Leisure</u>, our sport, fitness and leisure centres will help to provide easily accessible advice, nutrition guidance, support and activities for pupils and whole school communities.

As part of our strategy to identify mental health needs, by the end of this academic year, our secondary schools will ask pupils to participate in an anonymised online mental health screening tool to gain further insight into the levels of need for pupils across Anglian Learning.

Your child's wellbeing is important. We will actively share guidance on maintaining good mental health as part of our Belonging by Design: Mental Health approach. We aim for your child to have a sense of belonging within their school and to enable them to thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.


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Embedding ambitious, inclusive and enriching teaching and learning

Curriculum update

As part of the College Improvement Plan, we are focusing on how we can ensure that our classrooms are as inclusive as possible to ensure that all learners access an ambitious curriculum. We are using the diagram below as a vehicle for this work. This jigsaw puzzle is an effective way for us to communicate the key elements of our teaching and learning strategy.



The four cornerstones of the jigsaw underpin our whole school approach and are the foundation for excellence. The side pieces are being developed by subject teams as they represent how teachers teach to secure all students' learning and therefore need to be subject specific. The centre of the jigsaw, 'developing an independent learner' is our fundamental aim as a school. Independence enables students to thrive in all that they do in the five years that they are with us and in their lives beyond Linton Village College.

In the Summer term we will further consider what an independent learner looks like with colleagues and staff, which will shape a relaunch of the Linton Learner in September.

On 19th March, LVC hosted a SEND review with visiting SENCOs from Netherhall, Joyce Frankland Academy, Stour Valley Community School and a Specialist Teacher from the Trust. During the review, LVC's SEND provision, processes, and support for students with additional needs was looked at (in and out of the classroom). The review team carried out learning walks in a range of lessons and interviewed the SEND Leadership team. Highlights shared from their report commented on the calm and friendly feel of the school and how impressed they were with students' attitude to learning in lessons. They were also struck by the LSA's skilful support in class and teachers understanding and delivery of inclusive classrooms. An area they recognised would further support our learners would be for further screening tools to be developed for students with Social Emotional and Mental Health needs and for there to be a more consistent approach across all subjects with delivering elements of the Inclusive Classrooms framework. These are things that we will focus on during the summer term.

Behaviour Update

We continue to see an increase in students earning only positive house points for their engagement in learning, and a reduction in the number of negatives being recorded for many students.

Over 54% of LVC students have earned only positive house points, this is up from 50% in the Autumn term.

This term has seen positive changes across the College. The new seating in the common rooms has been well received, leading to more responsible use of these spaces. The Friends are planning to purchase more seats in the future. With the recent improved weather, it has been fantastic to see students making good use of the field at lunchtime. They have organised themselves well, with many football games being played simultaneously and others enjoying the weather.

The recent introduction of lining up for lessons has started well. This consistent approach helps students understand what is expected as they arrive and enter classrooms. We will continue to monitor this over the coming weeks until it becomes a habit. We entered eight of our top Mathematicians in Year 10 into the Cambridgeshire Maths Feast, hosted at LVC. The event comprised of problem solving, geometry and algebra. Out of twenty-one teams from twelve schools across Cambridgeshire, LVC placed 8th and 10th.

Michael Rosen visit

Michael is a British children's author, poet, presenter and academic and is now a professor of children's literature in the Department of Educational Studies at Goldsmiths, University of London. He has also served as Children's Laureate. This was our second visit from Michael. This time he conducted a series of workshops to a range of different year groups. At the end of the day, very unexpectedly, we had a visit from ITV who filmed an interview with Michael Rosen performing his poems in our library with the homework club looking on silently. This was broadcast on ITV.

Science Week

To celebrate Science Week, LVC holds a week-long series of events that are designed to inspire and engage our students. Science week has been a long-standing occurrence in the school's calendar. British Science Week is a 10-day celebration of science and innovation and is an initiative run by the British Science Association. The BSA believes that its remit is to continue to invest in and position the UK as a leader in undertaking research and development in a way that benefits all of society. Events that took place during LVC's Science Week in March included dissections, 'Shock and Awe' chemistry, a forensic investigation, a Science Fayre, a dance/science collaboration and a trip to Sizewell B Power Station. There were also a series of assemblies aimed at inspiring students to think about how they might change the world and how science can have an impact on that change.
