# **Trust Update**

As CEO of Anglian Learning, the school Trust which supports your child/ren's school, I would like to share some key highlights of the work we have undertaken in the last few months. These activities have benefitted the pupils, workforce and communities of our Trust. Firstly, I was delighted to attend our Platform 25 exhibition in Cambridge which brings together artwork from each of our secondary schools. As usual, the quality on display was impressive and many congratulations to all pupils whose work was exhibited. My thanks also to the art teachers across our Trust for their support of the exhibition, which was open to members of the public.

We also launched Anglian Learning's long-term strategy, which has three main areas of focus: Belonging by Design, Great Schools and Connected Communities. Next term, I will share with you more information about this strategy. We have already started to drive forward in each area, including the launch of webinars to support parent, carer and pupil wellbeing as part of Belonging by Design and working in partnership with the Foundation for Young People's Mental Health. We have been supporting the development of our school estate, using government funding to invest in EV chargers, refurbishing numerous classrooms, toilets and play facilities and, most ambitiously, working alongside the Department for Education to start the remodelling of Sawston Village College.

The school's vision and values align well with Anglian Learning's, making them a perfect fit for our community. We look forward to learning from each other and inviting their pupils to take part in our Trust-wide events in the coming months and years.

# **SLT Update**

#### The Linton Learner – Building Skills for Life

This September, we relaunched the Linton Learner framework, simplifying it to focus on two essential qualities: Caring and Independent. These behaviours are at the heart of helping students take ownership of their learning and decision-making—skills that will serve them well beyond LVC.

#### Why did we change?

We wanted to raise expectations and strengthen engagement by concentrating on what really matters: developing confident, responsible learners who truly care about themselves, and others.

#### What's happened so far?

- Students were introduced to the new behaviours in tutor time and assemblies at the start of term.
- Assemblies have explored some of these expectations in greater depth, such as habits and routines that build independence.
- Registration activities have helped students understand the 10 key statements and the rationale behind these.
- · Go4Schools behaviour logs have been updated to reflect these two key behaviours.
- snapshot reports now reflect these expectations, giving clearer feedback to students.
- Every classroom displays Linton Learner and Presentation guidelines to remind students of expectations.

#### What's the impact?

Students now have a much clearer sense of what it means to be a Linton Learner. We're already seeing more thoughtful conversations about learning and stronger personal responsibility.

#### What's next?

We'll review feedback from the recent Code of Conduct survey and continue working with students to ensure these qualities become second nature, helping them grow into truly caring and independent individuals.



### Developing Caring and Independent Linton Learners

In September, we introduced a revised Home Learning Policy at Linton Village College, shaped by feedback from students, parents and carers, and staff. The policy aims to make home learning clear, purposeful, and manageable, while supporting students' independence and confidence as learners. Key changes introduced following consultation include:

- A minimum of one week between tasks being set and their deadlines
- No home learning set during holidays for Key Stage 3, and no tasks posted after 5pm or at weekends
- A clear structure on Satchel One outlining What, Why and How
- Consistent guidelines for the amount and timing of tasks
- A reduction in the number of resources attached to home learning

These changes have led to a more consistent and predictable approach across the College. Students report greater clarity and confidence in managing their time, while families have highlighted improved communication and balance. Staff have also welcomed the increased consistency, helping home learning better support classroom learning without unnecessary pressure. We are continuing to review and evaluate our approach the home learning to help students to develop independent study skills that we support them to be successful learners at LVC and beyond.

#### Mr Wood - Teacher of Geography

#### What have you most enjoyed in your first term at LVC?

Getting stuck into fieldtrips, getting to know the students and absorbing the colleges' culture.

#### Miss Robb - Teacher of DT

#### What did you do before becoming a teacher?

A short 10 years ago, I was a student at LVC myself. After my first stint at University in Liverpool studying Fine Art, I came back to Cambridgeshire and became the DT and Art technician at LVC, filling some hours in the DT timetable as an unqualified teacher. Last year I went to Cambridge University to get my PGCE and now I'm back in the LVC community as a fully fledged member of the teaching staff.

#### Dr Boyd-Teacher of Maths and Science

#### What inspired you to become a teacher?

I was previously a professional scientist, and throughout my career I became increasingly aware of the importance of inspiring the next generation to engage with STEM subjects. I am particularly motivated to support pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds and underrepresented groups, who may not otherwise see science as accessible or relevant to them.

#### Mr Duggan – Teacher of Maths

#### What have you most enjoyed in your first term at LVC?

Having the opportunity to support the school's enrichment offer by going on the Battlefields trip was amazing, and it was so rewarding to see what the students got out of the trip.

#### Miss Vale – Teacher of English

#### What did you do before becoming a teacher?

I worked at the Board of Education for a major city in southern Japan. I was a language teacher, a translator, an events coordinator, and a cultural ambassador.

#### **Miss Beevers - Teacher of Maths**

#### What inspired you to become a teacher?

At my previous company I ran work experience programmes on a voluntary basis alongside my main role as a Data Consultant and really enjoyed working with young people, hence I wanted to make this my focus.

### Careers Education update

This term has been full of opportunities for students to learn about different career pathways and how people have reached their current roles. For our KS4 year groups, we held a joint Post-16 Providers Evening back in October. We recognise the value of giving students earlier opportunities to have conversations with providers and start thinking about their next steps. As we approach the holidays, our Year 11 students and their tutors have been working hard to finalise Post-16 college applications.

At KS3, there has been a greater focus on building transferable skills. Our Year 8 students took part in a "Skills in Action" workshop delivered by local business Illumina. During the session, they developed teamwork and problem-solving skills by tackling the challenge of building the tallest possible spaghetti and marshmallow tower. It was a great exercise in creativity and resilience, especially when structures collapsed and had to be rebuilt.

We also launched our Alumni Speaker Series this term, starting with former student Chris Negus. Chris shared his career journey after leaving LVC, which led to him becoming CEO of an international renewable energy company, Clobal NRC Advisory Ltd.

He gave students valuable advice, including staying curious, building genuine relationships, taking responsibility when opportunities arise, and remembering that your first job doesn't define your future.

# **Enrichment & Opportunities Beyond the Classroom**

At LVC, we believe that learning doesn't stop at the classroom door. This term, our students have enjoyed a wide range of enrichment opportunities designed to broaden horizons, spark curiosity, and develop new skills.

One of the highlights was the two-yearly Battlefields trip to Northern France and Belgium, led by the History Department. Ninety-five students from KS3 and KS4 visited key World War I sites, including Essex Farm Cemetery and an Advanced Dressing Station near Ypres, learning about medical care close to the front lines. At Mansel Copse and the Somme, they explored the realities of trench warfare and its human cost. The Thiepval Memorial and the moving Last Post ceremony offered powerful moments of reflection on remembrance and loss.

Over 100 students also visited Bletchley Park, the historic home of World War II codebreakers. They watched a live demonstration of the Enigma Machine and took part in hands-on decoding activities, discovering how logic, mathematics, and teamwork helped crack secret messages. This experience highlighted the vital role of codebreaking in the Allied victory and its lasting influence on modern computing and cybersecurity.

Another standout experience was our trip to see Hamilton in the West End. Fifty students were captivated by the energy, creativity, and emotion of the production. The show sparked conversations about history, storytelling, and performance, and many students described it as unforgettable. We are already planning our next West End musical visit for the summer term.



Closer to home, enrichment has been thriving every day. With over 40 clubs running this autumn, lunchtimes and after-school hours have been buzzing with activity. From Chess to Eurovision Club, Arts to Sports, History Film Club and Yoga—there truly is something for everyone. We're especially proud to see a growing number of clubs now being led by students, showcasing leadership, initiative, and creativity.

Our Eco Club has been hard at work building bird boxes to support local wildlife, part of our journey toward achieving the Eco Schools Award. Science Club continues to inspire curiosity with hands-on experiments every Tuesday, and next term will see the launch of a Creative Writing Club for budding authors. Our Maths Team will also begin preparing for the UKMT Challenge during lunchtime sessions.

This term also saw the launch of our new Enrichment Challenge, which is already proving popular. The challenge encourages students to take an active role in college life: Bronze and Silver awards recognise participation in extra-curricular activities, while Gold celebrates leadership through running a club. It's a fantastic way for students to set personal goals, develop confidence, and gain recognition for their efforts. We look forward to celebrating our first award recipients later this academic year.

These opportunities are only possible thanks to the dedication of teachers and support staff who give up their time to help our young people grow into well-rounded individuals. We thank them for their commitment and look forward to all the exciting things planned for the New Year.



We are delighted that our Arts Award provision includes the delivery of the Bronze Award across our curriculum in Year 7. This provision was recently featured as a case study by Arts Award:

#### <u>Cultivating Cultural Capital Through Arts Award</u>

Following Bronze, students may then study for their Silver and Gold through our extra-curricular provision. The Gold Award is normally delivered by post-16 providers as it is awarded with 16 UCAS points, we are delighted to be able to stretch and challenge our learners at LVC with this qualification.
